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

New Legislation for Veteran Healthcare

The bipartisan bill, known as the PACT (Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics) Act, was passed and signed by President Joe Biden in August. It expands healthcare benefits for veterans exposed to toxic burn pits. Speaking at a White House ceremony on August 10, Biden said that "veterans of the wars of Iraq and Afghanistan not only faced dangers in battle—they were breathing toxic smoke from burn pits." Biden traveled to Iraq dozens of times as a Senator and later as Vice President and recalls seeing the toxic fumes in the air. "Burn pits the size of football fields, an incinerated waste of war such as tires, poisonous chemicals, jet fuel, and so much I won't even mention," he said. "A lot of places where our soldiers were sleeping were literally a quarter or half mile away from it." Biden noted that "Less than 1% of you risk everything to defend 99% of the population. We owe you. You're the backbone. You're the steel. You're the sinew. You're the very fiber that makes this country what it is, and that's not hyperbole, that's a fact. As a nation, we have many obligations—and I've been saying this for a long time. We have many obligations but only one true sacred obligation: to equip those we send into harm's way and to care for them and their families when they come home." Danielle and Brielle Robinson, the wife and daughter of Sgt. 1st Class Heath Robinson, upon whom the PACT Act is named, introduced Biden at the signing ceremony. On a personal level, Biden's son Beau was deployed to Iraq in 2008 and diagnosed with brain cancer in 2013; he died two years later at the age of 46. Cancers, as well as 20 other presumptive conditions, have been linked to exposure from the fumes of burn pits. Jon Stewart was recognized at the WH ceremony for his pressure to Congress to pass the bill.

Passage and implementation of the PACT Act is one step in a series of efforts by the Biden-Harris Administration to address the harmful effects of environmental exposures affecting service men and women. In April 2022, the VA defined presumptive service connection for several rare respiratory cancers for certain veterans, and was able to complete more claims for veterans and survivors involving a possible presumption of rare respiratory cancer. In August 2021, the VA began processing disability claims for asthma, rhinitis, and sinusitis based on presumed exposure to particulate matter. Veterans who served in the Southwest Asia theater of operations and other areas, and who developed these conditions within 10 years of military service, are now eligible to apply for disability benefits and access to VA healthcare. Since August, the VA has completed 33,276 claims, granting over 25,000 veterans and their survivors benefits for one or more conditions, leading to over \$93M in retroactive benefit payments. The VA encourages veterans to file claims related to military environmental exposures. The VA has also improved training for VA and non-VA healthcare providers, and compensation and pension examiners, on assessing deployment related to environmental exposures through the TRAIN Learning Network and use of the Exposure Ed App (https://mobile.va.gov/app/exposure-ed). In addition, veterans with concerns about inconsistent healthcare treatment in relation to outcomes from military environmental exposures should be aware of VET-HOME, the Veterans Exposure Team-Health Outcomes of Military Exposures, launched earlier this year. By January 2023, the VA expects to have a fully operational call center and network of experts to help veterans concerned about environmental exposure and provide consultative services in primary clinics. The VA joins the nation in observing Women's Equality Day on August 26. The theme is "Celebrating Women's Right to Vote." Though Women's Equality Day commemorates the 1920 passage of the 19th Amendment securing women's right to vote, it also highlights women's continuing efforts to gain full equality. In some states, women—particularly those of color—were blocked from voting even after 1920. Women's Equality Day is an opportunity to reflect on the meaning and benefits of equality, and on the responsibility of cultivating inclusive communities that promote an equal voice for all, regardless of gender. VA managers and supervisors are encouraged to promote events and activities that recognize women and their many contributions to American society including military service. Public Health Updates

COVID-19. The White House continues to ensure that all Americans have easy and convenient access to the vaccines, treatments, tests, and other tools (e.g., masks) that protect against and treat COVID-19. These tools, even with the BA.5 variant, work to prevent serious illness, keep people out of the hospital, and save lives. BA.4 and BA.5—subvariants of the Omicron variant—now make up 80% of the COVID-19 cases in the U.S., with BA.5 accounting for a majority of cases. Early indications signal that BA.5 may have some increased ability to escape immunity, including from prior infections, meaning it has the potential to cause the numbers of infections to rise. More than 222M Americans are fully vaccinated, and over 106M people have at least their first booster shot, and virtually every American of every age is eligible for vaccination. Adults who are up-to-date with their vaccinations are 3.5 times less likely to be hospitalized than unvaccinated adults, and among those who are 50 and older, people who have received two booster shots are 42 times less likely to die from COVID-19 compared to those who are unvaccinated. Over 530M at-home test kits have been delivered to over 75M households for free, and are still available through COVIDtests.gov. Use of the Defense Production Act continues to provide an ample supply of high-quality masks, and 400M non-surgical N95 masks were released from the Strategic National Stockpile for free. As BA.5 cases rise, individuals are encouraged to wear masks in indoor public spaces. For immunocompromised individuals, pre-exposure prophylactics, such as Evusheld, are widely available.

Monkeypox. Over 9000 cases have been reported since the first case on May 18. Within two days from that initial outbreak, the government made the vaccine available, and over 670,000 vaccine doses have been distributed to date. Another 441,000 vials were released in August from the Strategic National Stockpile, and with alternate (intradermal) dosing will provide immunization for 2.2M Americans. (Intradermal dosing uses one-fifth the dose of subcutaneous dosing and provides a similar immune response. Intradermal administration is like a tuberculosis skin test.) Another 150,000 vials of the Jynneos vaccine—now totaling 750,000 doses—will arrive in the U.S. in September, and 5.5M vials (over 25M doses) have been ordered from Bavarian Nordic. Note that the treatment regimen requires a second dose after 28 days to get a complete, higher-level response.

LGBTQ Retreat for Veterans and Active Military

Project New Hope provides a weekend retreat for veterans and active military servicemembers. The program will help you to manage stress, build resiliency, cope with suicidal idealization and self-harm, and respond to rejection or bullying due to your LGBTQ identity. Relaxing activities include indoor rock climbing, hiking, yoga, reflexology, massage, reiki, etc. The program was founded by Bill Moore, a USAF disabled veteran. The registration fee is \$50/person or \$100/couple, and includes lodging, meals, and activities at no additional cost but you must provide your own transportation to Groton, Massachusetts. Gay and Lesbian Medical Association Annual Conference
